PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The School Psychology program

is designed to prepare competent graduate candidates in the study and practice of professional psychology with specific emphasis on cultural competence. The program espouses a scientist-practitioner model of training along with a behavioral-ecological approach for service delivery.

Further, the PhD program is approved/ nationally recognized by the National Association of School Psychologists (NASP) and aligned with the standards of training and practice set forth by the American Psychological Association (APA). The M.Ed./specialist program is aligned with NASP standards.

School psychology students complete clinical training in school districts, charter schools, and hospital-based clinics throughout the Washington, DC area, and have opportunities to practice in urban, suburban, and rural settings with children ages 3 through 21.

Competitive applicants have prior work or volunteer experiences working with children and families and a strong interest in working with underserved populations. Additionally, applicants to the PhD program must demonstrate an interest in conducting research.
