
Dr. Melody Andrews

#### Preparing for the Dissertation Advice from Dr. Thomas to Consider Before Taking ELPS 599

The purpose of the Research Preparation Seminar, ELPS 599, is to guide the doctoral student through the initial and formative stages of dissertation development in the student writing a Dissertation Proposal draft (that is, a draft of the dissertation's first three chapters).

This learning experience is designed to be an Applied Learning experience, which is an educational approach whereby participants learn by engaging in direct application of skills, theories, and models. This is not a "mock" learning experience, but the student is expected to produce a viable draft of the first three chapters of the dissertation or the dissertation proposal.

Understand that developing one's dissertation is a process: receiving feedback and making revisions are the norm; remaining open and flexible is essential throughout the process...



Additionally, once their draft if developed in this course the student's committee will likely have additional perspectives and feedback to further develop this document. Prior to beginning this course, it is important for the student to have done the following:

- \* Have developed viable research topic.
- \* Be able to identify and articulate their study's variables.
- \* Have considered a conceptual and/or theoretical framework.

\* Understand the appropriate methodological approach for conducting their study: This course is not a methods class and without competence in methodology, developing the dissertation proposal will be difficult.

\* Must have reviewed an appropriate amount of literature relevant to their intended study: the semester will not allow adequate time to read and review relevant literature as well as draft the dissertation proposal.

\* Have carefully read and reviewed several dissertations to understand the scope, depth, and breadth of such a document.

## DR. SOSANYA JONES



Dr. Jones and ELPS doctoral student Zakiyyah Ali were accepted into the 2023 cohort of The 1619 Project Education Network sponsored by The Pulitzer Center.

Their project, a collaboration with Dr. Blanca Vega, a higher education professor at Montclair State University (an HSI), and Marco Sanchez, a history teacher at a Manhattanbased middle school, is designed to generate content and pedagogical knowledge sharing about how to design and teach a curriculum that considers the history of Black people, slavery, and racism in the formation and practice of higher education.

Dr. Jones' invited article "Lifting the veil: Utilizing critical qualitative inquiry to demystify the public policymaking process" was published in a special issue of Qualitative Inquiry dedicated to Critical Qualitative Inquiry as an Avenue for Critical Public Policy Knowledge and Change


Dr. Jones' article "Administrative perspectives on designing programmatic support for Black collegiate women in higher education" was published in the College Student Affairs Journal.

Dr. Jones co-facilitated a Critical Educators for Social Justice fireside chat and presented three scholarly papers at this year's AERA in Chicago with co-authors ELPS student Melody Andrews and former HELPS student Karen Bussey.

Dr. Jones presented the paper entitled MSI faculty and tomorrow's higher education leaders: Lessons from the triple pandemic at this year's NASPA conference in Boston.

Dr. Jones will serve as Faculty Mentor for 2023-2024 Just Julian awardee Lyndsie Whitehead, a doctoral student in the HELPS program.

#### Vital and Valuable: The Relevance of HBCUs to American Life and Education by Omari Swinton and James Koch.

In Vital and Valuable, two distinguished economists provide a groundbreaking analysis of HBCUs. James V. Koch and Omari H. Swinton give a balanced assessment of the performance of HBCUs, examining metrics such as admissions and enrollment trends, graduation and retention rates, administrative expenses, spending on intercollegiate athletics, and student debt. They emphasize the distinctive features that make HBCUs what they are, considering whom they serve and how, while contextualizing these institutions within the landscape of American higher education.

## DR. KATHRYN WILEY


Dr. Wiley was selected as a PDK International Emerging Leaders Fellow for the 2023-2024 year.


