



Dr. Jones' paper on equity and stranded credits was cited in a federal amendment on Title IV, expanding the ban on institutions holding transcripts hostages for fees.

A book Dr. Jones co-edited with Dr. Palmer, and Dr. Flowers, "Black Scholarship in a White Academy" was released and is now available for purchase.

Dr.Robert Palmer and Dr. Sosanya Jones have published a book title, "Black Scholarship in a White Academy".

Robert T. Palmer, Alonzo M. Flowers III, and Sosanya Jones, Black Scholarship in a White Academy offers important perspectives on how Black faculty and their scholarship have been historically devalued within the academy, particularly in predominantly White academic spaces. Using anti-Blackness theory as a framework, contributors discuss how White hegemony operates to undervalue and obstruct Black scholarship and faculty. Covering such diverse topics as navigating the tenure process, building Black spaces for inclusion, and exploring the intersection of Blackness and disability in higher education, this book presents ways Black faculty can navigate and challenge systemic racism and racist toxicity within their institutions.

Dr. Joseph established two new programs within the School of Education this year in partnership with the Institute for Education Innovation. A new aspiring superintendent program and a new aspiring district leadership program have been established to support school leaders who want to pursue small district superintendent positions and central office leadership positions. This inaugural cohort has 52 participants in the aspiring district leader program and 33 participants in the aspiring superintendent program. This paper was co-written by Dr. Khalid Arar, Professor, Texas State University, Dr. Salman Elbedour, Professor, Howard University, and Dr. Hasan Karaburk, President of Washington University of Science and Technology.
