We are thrilled to announce that Dr. Ashleigh Brown-Grier's international HBCU xChange, Inc. has received a U.S. Embassy Public Diplomacy grant to fund the Historically Black Institution eXperience (HBIx)

Program. This groundbreaking initiative will foster research collaborations and partnerships between Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) in the United States and Historically Black Universities (HBUs) in South Africa.

In partnership with the U.S. Consulate in Durban, the HBIx Program will explore key themes such as tourism and entrepreneurship, history and her story, cultural literacy and language, and waterways and land. The program utilizes Pan-African and Indigenous Knowledge Theoretical Frameworks and digital storytelling to offer participants a unique opportunity to engage with these critical topics through diverse perspectives.
